

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

# BUILDINGS AND GARDENS ON DISPLAY "Building on the Past"

#### 1. COLTON HALL

Built by Monterey's first alcalde under American rule, Walter Colton, in 1849. The California Constitutional Convention was held that same year in the large upstairs hall. It is owned by the City of Monterey and maintained as a museum. *Pacific Street between Jefferson and Madison* 

# 2. VASQUEZ ADOBE

As it stands today, this adobe bears little resemblance to the original small building which was built in 1840-1841 by an uncle of Tiburcio Vasquez, a flamboyant bandit was finally captured and hung in San Jose in 1876. The house is now owned by the City of Monterey and houses the city Recreation Department.

#### 3. UNDERWOOD-BROWN ADOBE

Built by Santiago Stokes in 1843 as a private residence, this adobe now houses the Monterey City Manager's office. The City of Monterey carefully incorporated the little adobe into construction of the city complex in 1934.

## 4. GORDON HOUSE

This home was built in 1849 by Philip Roach, the last Alcalde and first Mayor of Monterey. It was one of the first non-adobe dwellings in Monterey and owned privately until the City of Monterey purchased the home. It is leased as a private home.

#### 5. MONTEREY MUSEUM OF ART

Built in the early 1900s, it was used as a mortuary and later the County Court House. The Museum offers both permanent and changing exhibits with an emphasis on the art of California and the Monterey region.

# 6. LARKIN HOUSE AND SHERMAN'S QUARTERS

One of the fine examples of Monterey Colonial architecture. Built in 1834 by Juan Bautista Rogerio Cooper's (builder of Cooper-Molera Adobe) half brother, Thomas Larkin. Larkin was the first and only Consul to California. Also on the grounds is a small one room stone and adobe structure which served as office space for military headquarters during the first months of U.S. military occupancy in Monterey. Two young officers attached to the American Third Artillery, Lieut. William Tecumseh

Sherman and Captain Henry W. Halleck, arrived in Monterey in 1847, and used this building for their office. These two officers were active in the social life of Monterey, with Halleck becoming California's first Secretary of State. They later returned east to become generals in the Civil War. Now a unit of Monterey State Historic Park. 510 Calle Principal

#### 7. HOUSE OF THE FOUR WINDS

The first house with a weather vane (thus the name) was built in 1835. It was originally part of the large piece of property developed by Thomas Larkin, and rented out to house businesses and families. It was the first Hall of Records for the newly formed County of Monterey. It was here William S. Johnson, County Recorder, had his office and home in the 1850s. The Monterey Civic Club purchased it in 1914, restored it and added a meeting room.

#### 8. CASA AMESTI AND GARDEN

A fine example of Monterey colonial architecture, Casa Amesti was built by Jose Amesti in the 1830s. It was purchased and restored by interior designer Frances Elkins in 1953, who bequeathed it to the National Trust for Historic Preservation. It is now headquarters for the Old Capital Club.

#### 9. COOPER-MOLERA ADOBE

The home of Captain John Rogers Cooper who came to Monterey in 1823. He changed his name to Juan Bautista Rogerio Cooper, his citizenship to Mexico and his religion to Catholicism. He then married into the prominent Vallejo family. By 1829 he obtained a town lot and was planning a home for his bride. Originally a long one story home, by the 1850s he had converted the southern section to the two-story structure we see today. His half-brother, Thomas Larkin, U.S. consul and signer of the Constitution, came to Monterey from their Boston home at Cooper's request. Now a unit of Monterey State Historic Park.

Polk and Munras Streets - South end of Alvarado Street

#### 10. STEVENSON HOUSE AND GARDEN

Built in the early 1830s by Rafael Gonzales, Administrator of the Custom House, this two-story adobe was known as the French Hotel when Robert Louis Stevenson stayed there in 1879. It contains Stevenson memorabilia, first edition books and furniture donated by his family. Now a unit of Monterey State Historic Park.

### 11. CASA ABREGO

Built by Don Jose Abrego, who came to Monterey in 1834, it is made of adobe bricks and wood. To save it from destruction the Monterey Foundation bought and sold it to the private women's club in 1959.

#### 12. CASA SERRANO

Thomas Larkin purchased the building from an Irishman, John Chamberlain, in the early 1840s as a two-room adobe. He sold it to Don Florencio Serrano in 1845 after adding one more room. Larkin appointed the Don headmaster of the first American school in California paid for with public frunds, and Serrano established his school in the Casa Serrano parlor. Purchased and restored by the Monterey History and Art Association in 1959, it houses an important collection of California paintings and antiques. *412 Pacific Street* 

#### 13. CASA SOBERANES AND GARDEN

Known as the "House with the Blue Gate," Casa Soberanes is a unique example of the intermingling of architecture of Southern Spain and New England. Its preservation was assured in 1957 when Mrs. Mayo Hayes O'Donnell presented it to the State of California as a unit of Monterey State Historic Park.

#### 14. CALIFORNIA'S FIRST THEATRE AND GARDEN

Built in the 1840s by Jack Swan as a saloon and apartment house, it was converted into a theatre for production of melodramas at the close of the Mexican War.

Scott and Pacific Streets

#### 15. PERRY HOUSE/CARRIAGE HOUSE

This elegant Victorian-style home was built in 1860 by whaling captain Manuel Perry and his wife, Mary de Mello Silva, of Boston. Acquired by the Monterey History and Art Association in 1997, this is the new home of the Association's Historic Costume Collection.

### 16. DOUD HOUSE AND GARDEN

Irish-born Francis Doud helped with the arrangements for the Constitutional Convention and supplied his own homemade kitchen table to be used for the Speaker at Colton Hall during the Constitutional Convention. He built this wooden home overlooking Monterey Bay in the New England style. Monterey History and Art Association acquired the house in 1969.

## 17. MAYO HAYES O'DONNELL LIBRARY

Originally St. James Episcopal Church, it was built in 1876 on Pacific Street as the first Protestant church in Monterey. It was moved to its present location in 1969 by the Monterey History and Art Association. Renamed in recognition of O'Donnell's dedicated service to the Association, it houses an excellent research library of California history.

#### 18. OLD WHALING STATION

Built in the 1840s by David Wright, a Scotsman, his adobe was modeled on the plan of Wright's ancestral home. In the 1850s it became a boarding house and headquarters for Portuguese whalers. A whalebone sidewalk is a reminder of the importance of whaling in California's economy. It is now a unit of Monterey State Historic Park and is leased to the Junior League for their headquarters.

#### 19. BOSTON STORE/SENSORY GARDEN

The Boston Store was originally called Casa del Oro (House of Gold). Constructed of chalk rock and adobe in the 1840s by Thomas Larkin, it was leased to Joseph Boston in the 1850s for a general merchandise store. The Historic Garden League operates it as the Boston Store. The Sensory Garden is a project of the Monterey History and Art Association.

Scott and Olivier Streets

#### 20. PACIFIC HOUSE

The long two-story adobe was built in 1847 for Thomas Larkin and has served as a hotel, courtroom, jury room and County Clerk's office, ballroom, newspaper office and a church. It was deeded to the State in 1954 and is maintained as a museum.

Custom House Plaza

#### 21. CUSTOM HOUSE

When the Mexican government opened the port of Monterey to foreign trade in the early 1820s, revenue was collected from custom duties. This adobe building, begun in 1827, was completed in 1846. It is the oldest government building on the Pacific Coast. Monterey State Historic Park maintains it as a museum.

#### 22. MARITIME MUSEUM OF MONTEREY

A project of the Monterey History and Art Association, the museum explores a seafaring heritage linking Spanish conquistadors, mission settlement, trade, fishing, and a powerful U.S. Navy. Home of the Allen Knight Maritime Collection, the museum features the First Order Fresnel Lens from the Point Sur Lighthouse. The museum now has new interactive exhibits, including videos featuring stories of the *USS Macon* and local fishermen. *Custom House Plaza*

#### THE MONTEREY HISTORY AND ART ASSOCIATION

Monterey History and Art Association was formed in 1931 by a group of residents and artists dedicated to the preservation of historic buildings and artifacts, promoting educational and cultural programs, and important collections unique to the Central Coast and all California. MHAA founders list includes some well-known early California artists such as E. Charlton Fortune, Armin Hansen and Myron Oliver.

MHAA continues the philosophy and work outlined by it's founders, expanding its programs and exhibits to meet the needs of a new generation. The Association owns and operates the Stanton Center which features the Maritime Museum and houses the administrative offices of the Museum and the Association. The Maritime Museum celebrates the seafaring history of Monterey Bay linking Spanish explorers, mission settlements, trade, fishing and the U.S. Navy. The museum features interactive exhibits and a major changing exhibit program.

Other buildings owned and rescued by the Association's members include:

- \*Casa Serrano one of Monterey's earliest homes
- \*Doud House a unique example of colonial architecture in Monterey
- \*Mayo Hayes O'Donnell Library an Episcopal church built in 1876
- \*Fremont Adobe possibly used by General Fremont in 1846
- \*Perry-Downer House the home of our Historic Costume Collection. The collection features more than 3,500 articles of clothing important to both local and state cultural history. These items are now part of a regular series of exhibits in the House gallery.

Monterey History and Art Association is an active organization, with hundreds of volunteers and a busy calendar of both public and membersonly activities. Association members and volunteers play an active role in preserving local history by acting as board and committee members, docents to our many exhibits and volunteers for our many programs and events.
